Comment (if applicable): Some landscape detail has been supplied via a landscape plan. The proposed hedging is appropriate as are the plant sizes and spacings.

The plan shows proposed tree planting. Generally the species choice is appropriate however it does mention planting ash trees. Ash should not be planted due to ash die-back and I recommend that this is swapped for hornbeam. It would also be useful to know the size of the trees being planted.

Recommendations and conclusion

The proposed tree protection is appropriate and sufficient to discharge the condition.

There are some minor details regarding the landscape proposes need to be clarified (see above) before the condition can be discharged.
