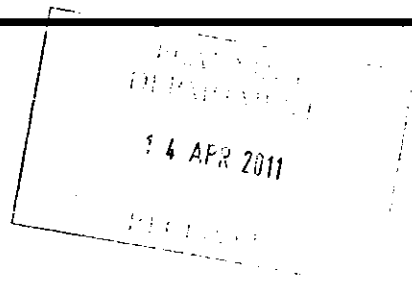

Hello Darren,

I was reading #7 in your 10 reasons to vote conservative and I feel strongly about WGC's heritage and culture.

Here are some thoughts that I have shared with a few others on the subject of Tesco and Broadwater Road ...

My initial concern is that WGC will lose its character. It is a very special town and I feel very strongly about the ideals that Ebonezer Howard set out to achieve, marrying town and country, balancing agriculture, industry and homes. We have lost some of the original ideals but the town centre still embodies the original vision and I want it to continue to do so.

I note that Tesco offer a swimming pool, a heritage centre etc as part of their plans. I would be very worried that if consent was given that these things may not materialise as originally envisaged.

But a bigger concern is why is a supermarket doing our town planning? Why can't our Planning department plan the town and then get the appropriate organisations to tender for whatever needs to be built - a pool, a supermarket, restaurants, museum etc. On Parkway there is a memorial to Theodore Chambers, CEO of the company that built WGC to Ebonezer Howard's ideal and plans. Isn't this what we need now? Someone to own the vision (the town planners, not Tesco) and someone to implement the vision. Isn't this the true character of WGC?
